



## Refugee Communities History Project

### Free CD Roms and Visual Displays Available

The RCHP is an oral and visual history project that aims to highlight the social, cultural and economic contribution that refugees have made to London since 1951. It is run by the Evelyn Oldfield Unit in partnership with fifteen refugee community organisations, London Metropolitan University and the Museum of London.

The project has produced the following materials, which are free to schools, supplementary schools, libraries, and any other interested organisation.

- Photo exhibition featuring activities of the Tamil community in London. Mounted on A1, red card, laminated. The exhibition includes very high quality photographs displayed alongside quotes from Tamil refugees interviewed for the project.
- Exhibition featuring the 13 interviewees from the Iraqi community, focusing particularly on their first impressions on arriving in London, and their achievements and contributions. Mounted on A1 black card, and laminated.
- Beautiful, professional quality photos featuring interviewees from the Former Yugoslavia, framed in A2 black card, displayed alongside quotes from their interviews.
- Display focusing on the activities of the Latin American community in London. Includes photographs of Latin American interviewees, along with quotes taken from their interviews. Mounted on A1 card.
- Childhood Landscapes: An audio and visual CD Rom featuring childhood memories, traditional stories and activities and puzzles from around the world. Recorded in English and many other languages.
- Afghan Oral History: An interactive CD Rom featuring the interviewees from the Afghan community talking of their arrival in the UK, their impressions of London, reasons for leaving Afghanistan and contributions made to London life.
